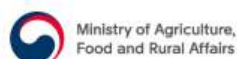

Jeju is blessed with pristine nature and a wealth of agricultural and fisheries traditions that embody the wisdom of our ancestors.

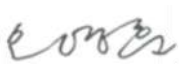

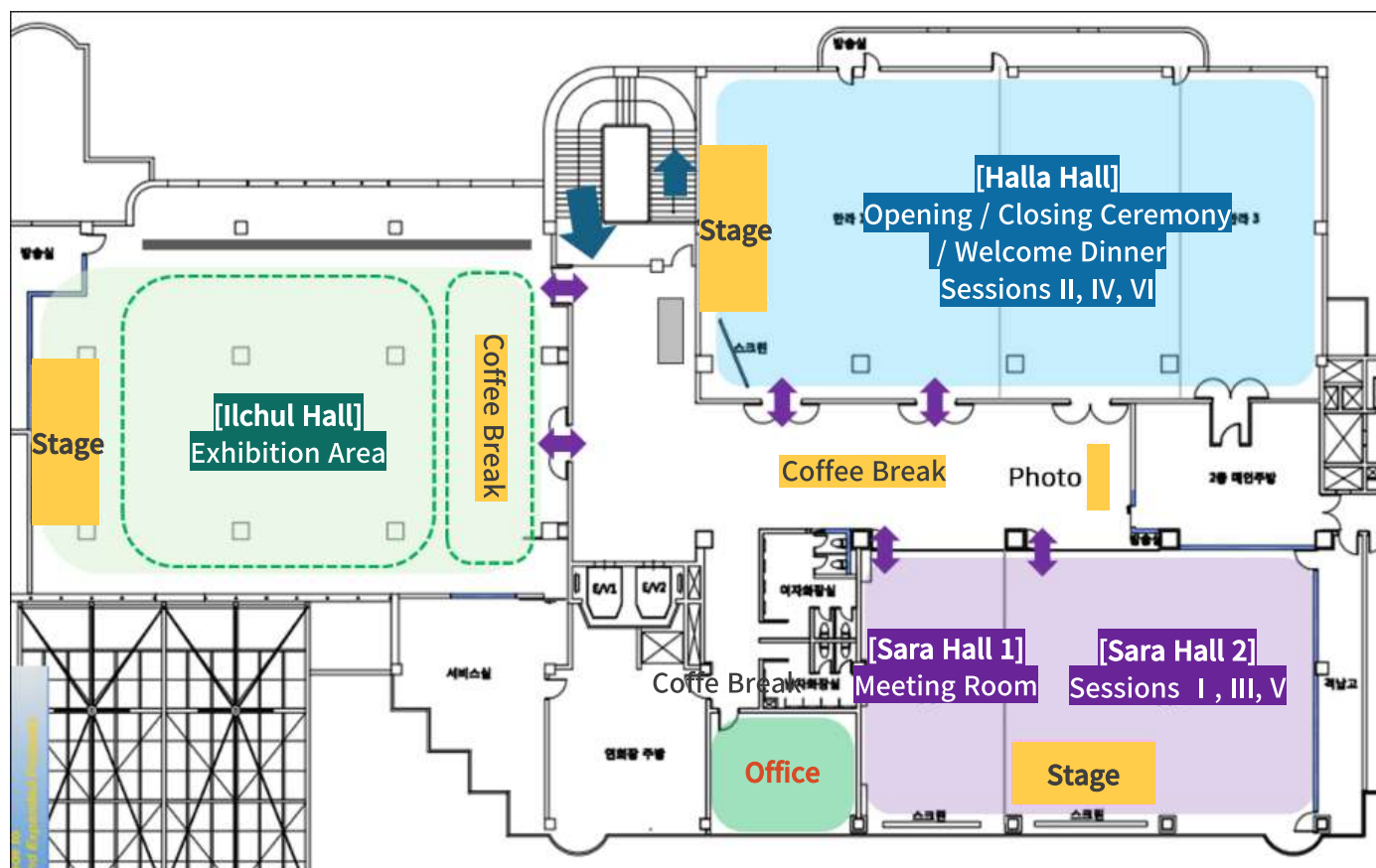

Jeju Stone Park

Jeju Stone Park is a museum and ecological park that shows the “birthplace of stones,” Jeju Island, and systematic stone culture. It is vast enough to display every type of the stone statues of Jeju Island. The entire park is built under the theme of Seolmundae Halmang and the Obaek (500) Generals, the two foundation myths of Jeju Island, **so it is a representative place with all the elements of Jeju Stone culture that coexist with stone.**



Jeju Haenyeo Museum

Exhibitions on marine, fishing villages, folklore, and fishing areas centered on Jeju's haenyeo culture, which has a long history from its origins. All the exhibits inside and outside the museum are donated by haenyeo, and an actual haenyeo house has been donated to the exhibition hall. Details of food culture, nurturing, half-fishing and half farming, and yeongdeungpogut culture are all displayed. Here is a **representative exhibition space of haenyeo culture, which symbolizes the strength of Jeju women.**



Jilgraenge Center

Founded and operated by the Sehwa Village Cooperative in Gujwa-eup, Jeju-si (477 residents), **it is a representative Jeju-type complex cultural space that finds local cultural color and develops solidarity among residents.** It operates a travel center, bakery cafe, local food sales, accommodation, and operation. Representative sustainable rural tourism village selected by the United Nations World Tourism Organization. (UNWTO)



Sumbisori Trail

This is a field wall path where you can feel the life of Jeju haenyeo, which was built around the Haenyeo Museum, and it is called 'Hadori Field Damgil' and 'Breathing-sound Trail'. The haenyeo exhales the air they have held, enduring while working under water, and the sound is called sumbisori. In past years the haenyeo of Jeju maintained their lives by farming in addition to diving, and the road that the haenyeo passed back and forth between diving and field work is called the Sumbisori Trail.



Jeju Donghwa Village (Jesco Mart)

Jeju Donghwa Village is an eco-friendly park located at the center of Oreum Valley in the eastern part of Jeju. It maintains the alignment of the surrounding Oreum Ridge and continuity of the landscape, **an open park designed under the theme of Jeju's trees, Jeju's stones, Jeju's culture and people, and flowers from all seasons.** It also features a shopping mall linked to “6th Industry.”

Hand-made agricultural heritage Jeju Batdam

-FAO Globally Important Agricultural Heritage, Jeju Batdam Agricultural System-



The southernmost volcanic island off the Korean Peninsula, Jeju Island. Its topography, geology, and climate characteristics are the harsh agricultural environment of the island itself. However, the islanders built more than 22,000 km of Batdam by hand using stones picked and dug from the soil. The Jeju Batdam, which was created in this way, protects crops by preventing wind and soil loss, as well as representing the aesthetics of Jeju Island with its outstanding agricultural and cultural landscape. It has been part of the agriculture of Jeju Island for more than 1,000 years, enduring numerous challenges such as farmland reorganization and the spread of urbanization. In addition, as the Jeju Batdam Agricultural System has been registered as a Globally Important Agricultural Heritage System, it is increasing the sustainability of Jeju agriculture by promoting the preservation and utilization of Batdam.

Jeju Batdam Agricultural System



Batdam that lasted a thousand years

The will and wisdom of the Jeju people are contained in the batdam. Batdam are the product of the will to ease the cultivation of stony land together with the wisdom to overcome the barren, windy environment through the use of stones piled up using carefully correct engagement of large and small stones to prevent them from being blown over. Chinks between the rocks cut up the wind stream and soften it. It is the secret of these Batdam, for centuries standing firm against powerful winds.

Various types of Batdam

The shape of the Jeju Batdam varies greatly because they are properly built according to the characteristics of the places they are located. The general form is 'oeidam(outer walls)', and various forms are extant, such as jeopdam or jatdam in places where there are a great many stones, as well as japgubdam in sloping areas too.

Heukryongman-ri Embroidered Jeju Island

As Batdam began to accumulate and over a very long period, Jeju Island became a mosaic embroidered with Batdam. They make up more than 22,000 km, a distance more than half-way around the earth! That's why the Jeju Batdam are called “Heukryongman-ri.” The name was given because the black basalt walls continue relentlessly, and the meandering flow resembles heukryong, a black dragon. The word “Man-ri” is an old term for a unit of length, equivalent to about 22,000 kilometers, an enormous distance that reminds us of the will and sweat of Jeju ancestors.



A huge human heritage 'Jeju Batdam'

In addition to its agricultural function, the Batdam creates an outstanding cultural landscape. It also has social and cultural values, such as the pioneering spirit of the Jeju people and a symbol of coexistence with nature. It is also emerging as a theme of rural tourism. As a huge human heritage that is second only to natural heritage, the sustainability of agriculture must be guaranteed, and these ways need to be preserved as a treasure that embodies Jeju culture.

Efforts to Protect and Nurture

With the designation of national and globally agricultural heritage sites, various efforts are under way to preserve and utilize the Jeju Batdam. Various activities are being carried out, such as designating management districts, creating theme parks, operating academies, holding Batdam festivals, creating Batdam villages, and developing Batdam products.

Jeju Haenyeo Fisheries Designated as a GIAHS



Meaning of Haenyeo Fisheries

Jeju 'Haenyeo Fisheries' was listed on the Globally Important Agricultural Heritage List (GIAHS) in November 2023. Haenyeo fishing is a unique traditional system in which haenyeo women dive into the sea without breathing devices to collect useful marine products such as abalone, conch, and seaweed. In particular, multi-dimensional knowledge and technology for understanding the sea topography by diving underwater and finding and collecting habitats for aquatic life are important strategic actions for haenyeo fishing. Jeju haenyeo fishing work has been handed down, and is designated as National Important Fisheries Heritage (KIFHS) No. 1. In addition, the Jeju haenyeo were registered as GIAHS in November 2023 in recognition of their ecological sustainability and community value.



History of the Haenyeo

The historical records of the Jeju haenyeo were recorded in the 28th year of King Sukjong (1702). In the Annals of the Joseon Dynasty, it is recorded as jamnyeo, and in the Annals of the Joseon Dynasty in the 40th year of King Sukjong (1714), it is recorded as haenyeo. As of 2024, the total number of Jeju haenyeo was 2,623, down 27.4% from 3,613 in 2020 and down 7.6% from 2,839 in 2023. By age, 1,594 women aged 70 or older accounted for 60.8%, 758 aged 60 to 69, 28.9%, 144 aged 50 to 59 years old, 5.5%, and 121 aged 30 to 49 years old, accounting for 4.6%. Jeju haenyeo are on continuous decline, and the small number of haenyeo under the age of 30 has stayed about the same.

Haenyeo Culture



Haenyeo culture refers to tangible and intangible cultural heritages that have arisen from life along with the work of haenyeo. It is defined to include najam techniques, fish folk knowledge, faith, songs, work tools and clothing, and community customs. Haenyeo cultural resources are divided into tangible and intangible cultural resources, tangible cultural resources are divided into bulteok, haesindang, haenyeo clothes, or work tools, while intangible cultural resources include haenyeo gut (spiritual rituals), haenyeo songs, and haenyeo legends.

- **Bulteok:** a place where haenyeo prepare work or take a break
- **Haesindang:** In each seaside fishing village on Jeju Island, there is at least one haesindang, a place where fishermen and haenyeo living with the sea as their living ground. Haesindang refers to a shrine for the seaside village.
- **Jamsu-gut and yongwang-gut:** A ritual place to pray for the safety and abundance of haenyeo is located in the haesindang, located near where the jamsu-gut and yongwang-gut are held, and for jamsu-gut and yongwang-gut, the haenyeo pays for the sacrifice preparation and gut ritual. It shows that livelihood and ritual become one.
- **Haenyeo songs:** songs sung mainly while rowing or sculling a boat to islands such as Biyangdo and Jigwido or while returning to the mainland, or while carrying a tewak and doing fishing work or swimming.
- **Haenyeo Legends:** There are many tales related to Jeju haenyeo, such as 'Jinju Halmang', 'Coral Haenyeo', 'Manhaengi Halmang', 'Yonggung Olle', and 'Jeombok Halmang', and there are also tales related to haesindang, such as the 'Aegipogae Legend'.

Major area for haenyeo

The "village fishing grounds" where haenyeo operate refer to the waters licensed pursuant to Article 9 (1) of the Fisheries Act, and the licensed fishing grounds are 7,738 ha in Jeju City and 6,693ha in Seogwipo City, a total of 14,431 ha. The haenyeo belong to the Jejusi Suhyup, Hallim Suhyup, Moseulpo Suhyup, Seogwipo Suhyup, Seongsanpo Suhyup, and Chuja-do Suhyup, and they belong to the fishing village fishing community under the jurisdiction of the Suhyup (National Federation of Fisheries Cooperatives).
